























### Dear Friends,

September is a full month! We'll enjoy the beginning of Children & Youth Sunday School, Sunday evening Youth Group, and Bible Study the week of September 11th. We're also launching our annual stewardship campaign which will take place September 11th through October 2nd. #### Altoona Christian Church August 22, 2016 Board Meeting Minutes



Attendees: Scott Seeliger, John (JC) Horton, Russ Wilkins, Pastor McKinna Daugherty, Chris Williams, Len Shaw, Tom Schirmer, Jeanne Schirmer, Georgia Woodward, Judy Wadding, and David Peebler

JC called the meeting to order at 7:09 PM. Pastor McKinna opened the meeting with prayer.

Judy Wadding was present to talk about National Night Out. This year's event was very successful as we had over 40 volunteers from ACC help put the event on and there was a large turnout from the community. Certificates of appreciation have all been delivered to the local businesses that helped with contributions. Judy indicated that the Altoona Police Department did express interest in having us host again next year, and she wanted to see if that would be approved by the Board. The Board agreed by consensus that we should host again and the National Night Out Committee work with Outreach to develop a budget to help cover supplies for next year's event. JC noted that this new committee is the second ad hoc committee that has been formed this year that falls under Outreach — the other being That Night in Bethlehem. JC agreed to attend the next Outreach meeting to explain the reasoning and need for these two ad hoc committees to be placed under Outreach. Pastor McKinna wanted to formally express her deep gratitude for Judy's leadership in helping make the National Night Out a complete success.

Georgia Woodward was present to talk about the 150 Year Celebration. Georgia went over the preliminary schedule of events, having at least one event per month culminating on Dedication Sunday which is July 30<sup>th</sup>, 2017. Georgia also submitted a budget to the Board totaling \$5600. Discussion took place and noted that \$3000 of the proposed budget was for the commissioning of a hymn which had already been approved by the Board at the May 2016 meeting. After further discussion, by consensus, the Board approved an additional \$3000 for the 150 Year Celebration budget.

Chris Williams was present to talk about the upcoming Stewardship Campaign. Chris presented an example of the 2017 Proposed Budget for ACC because it would be part of the campaign communication to the Congregation. Discussion took place and Scott suggested that we go ahead and include the 2017 Proposed Budget and to include mentioning the 150 Year Celebration and the need for new carpeting, new sign along 1<sup>st</sup> Ave, and have the Property Committee identify a third most pressing need for capital improvements to the property – all of which will need additional funding above and beyond normal giving to ACC. By consensus, the Board approved the Stewardship Campaign to move forward.

Pastor McKinna submitted the Pastor's reports for both July and August and highlighted a few items to celebrate.

#### **Board Reports**

At Large: Len indicated nothing new to report. Scott asked to see if there had been any more feedback from a concern that Len mentioned at a previous meeting and Len indicated that he had not heard anything new.

Elders: Tom indicated that they had not met since last meeting. He also indicated that they are getting low on having prayer shawls available.

Financial Secretary: No report submitted

Treasurer: Russ provided a current report which the Board reviewed.

Memorial Fund: Chris indicated that Tyler Glass is finishing up his Eagle Scout project which the Memorial Fund helped finance. Once the final cost comes in, Chris will take a look to see how much monies are left to proceed in getting a new refrigerator for the kitchen.

Personnel: Jeanne submitted a report.

Vice Moderator: JC submitted report from Christian Nurture, but noted that he has not received reports from a few areas of the Ministry Council for some time now. Scott and/or JC will reach out to the areas to touch base and ensure they are still meeting regularly to help achieve the Mission of ACC.

#### Closing

Tom shared a closing prayer. Meeting was adjourned at 9:53 PM. Respectfully submitted, David Peebler - Board Secretary


# Fall Bible Study




#### Ruth O'Connor—Caring Hands Food Pantry

July of 2016 found 267 families coming to the food pantry for assistance: 491 adults and 350 children, for a total of 841 persons served. Forty-one of these families came for the first time this year. Poundage of food given was 6,573 lbs., not counting the bread, pastry items and fruits and vegetables donated by some of the local stores. Two hundred sixty-three vouchers for \$8.00 were handed out to be used at the Fareway Stores at Altoona or Pleasant Hill or the Brick Street Market at Bondurant, to be used for perishable items. Personal items such as toothpaste, toothbrushes, shampoo, etc. are also given. Laundry detergent is given every other month. Rent assistance checks for \$1,517.98 and utility assistance checks for \$971.00 were written as well. From January through June of 2016, 517 different families have come to the pantry for assistance with food, personal items and/or financial help.

#### Food needed this month: Macaroni and Peanut Butter

A "Simple Supper" is provided for our food pantry clients the last Monday of each month from 5:30 – 6:30 p.m. at Adventure-Life Church, and is provided by churches, organizations and families in the SEP area. The August 29th Simple Supper will be provided by Christ the King Lutheran Church, and on September 26th, the Lions Club will prepare the meal. Statistics for the Clothes Hanger for July are: 150 families assisted – (301 adults and 227 children) totaling 528 individuals. Clothing items given totaled 2,486 and household items, 13. On behalf of our clients we say a "HUGE THANK YOU" to all of the individuals, churches, businesses, schools and organizations who are so very generous in donating food and finances to the pantry. It is all so much appreciated, and we pray your lives will be richly blessed.

## Altoona Christian Church 150<sup>th</sup> News! "Christ in Gethsemane" – a painting

We pause to look upon the well-known picture of "Christ in Gethsemane" by Johann Heinrich Hofmann, which has been painted for us by George Racklemann, an artist with unusually fine talent. A portion of the money for the picture was given by the daughter and son of the late Mr. & Mrs. Will Iseminger, in whose memory this picture is dedicated. The ladies of the Rainbow Circle also made it possible for us to have this painting by raising the balance of the money. And had it not been for the generous spirit of Mr. Racklemann, we would not have this lovely painting in our sanctuary. It is indeed a masterpiece revealing the artistic skill and the sense of a love for the good and the beautiful which Mr. Racklemann represents.

The picture of "Christ in Gethsemane" by Hofmann is one of the most beautiful as well as one of the most widely known paintings in all the world. Perhaps no other single scene in the life of Christ has been more frequently copied than this one. This is true, no doubt, because of the fact that the artist has portrayed the "ideal" against the background of the "real" for us in a masterly way.

Earlier in the night, Jesus had left eight of the disciples at the entrance of the garden, taking with Him into its deeper recesses the three who, on more than one occasion, had entered into a deeper fellowship with Him. But in this, the hour of His deepest suffering, He has withdrawn from even these three and is facing the crisis "alone."

Here, in one of the loneliest spots that could possibly be found, the artist portrays Jesus kneeling with outstretched, clasped hands before a barren rock, that glaringly hurls back the reflection of heavenly light. The upturned face of the Master in this midnight vigil is illuminated by a light that seems to come down from above. It is the only light in the picture save that which the artist has used as a halo about the head of Christ to suggest His spiritual struggle against the evil forces in the world. Here in this background Christ begins the agonizing process of man's redemption from sin by bringing his will into complete harmony with that of His Heavenly Father's.

The struggle of Jesus in Gethsemane was the endeavor to harmonize His personal human will with His Father's will. It was to accept a course of events the good purpose of which he could not fathom; it was to avoid not the tortures of the cross but drinking the cup of failure bitterer than death. If he died, what would become of that sublime vision of a regenerated social order that apparently He along had seen? What would become of His disciples who had hardly absorbed as yet the first principles of the Kingdom of Righteousness? From the distance of the Mount of Transfiguration a martyr's death had seemed to have a place in the great scheme of things, but now when death was at hand the tragedy to His cause seemed irreparable. Death simply could not be! Yet the outcome of His struggle was a victory of faith over sight, a surrender of His entire personal interests and the interests of the Kingdom into the Father's keeping. Henceforth He could face death or life with the calm consciousness which had been His in former days, "I do always the things that please Him."

#### ABOUT THE ARTIST



At the present he is the artist in the window display department of Younker Bros. Department Store in Des Moines, Iowa. Mr. Racklemann is married and has one daughter and one son.

#### UPDATE:

In 1988, Mike Nieters had the painting reframed as a memorial to his father. Since 1988, the painting has hung in the Narthex of our present church. (Original writing/documentation of the "Christ in Gethsemane" painting was found in an April 10, 1955 church bulletin, at the time of the dedication of the painting).

### What you do:


- 1. Turn the bowl upside down and trace around it on both pieces of paper.




